MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL TEAM

Hello and Happy Friday!

It is hard to believe that we are already at the tail end of Week 8! Students, staff and parents in our KHPS community have been working hard all term on every manner of learning and building community. As Principal, one of my greatest honours and pleasures is to welcome to my office students who share with me their learning and achievement of their goals; and this term, I have enjoyed discussing learning and growth with some of our budding young writers.

In our last newsletter, I told you about a resource our staff have been using to support improvements to learning and teaching of reading across the school. Also this year, our Literacy Action Team, led by Amy Jones and Annaka Wheatley, have been working together and with all staff and students to enhance our teaching and learning of writing. As neurologists learn more about the brain and how learning works, so educators must change their teaching practices to better support every student to improve their learning.

It is exciting to see with the release of the 2019 NAPLAN results this week the positive impact of the efforts our teachers and our students to improve our learning and teaching in reading and writing. One of the ways the Department currently measures school performance in NAPLAN is by looking at the proportion of students who score in the top two bands.

This year, in Writing, 65% of our year 3 students scored in the top two bands, as compared with 57% of Victorian students and 60% of students in schools similar in size and demographic to KHPS. In Reading, 69% of our year 3 students scored in the top two bands, as compared with 57% of Victorian students and 63% of students in schools similar in size and demographic to KHPS. Our year 5 students also showed strong results: in Reading, 64% scored in the top two bands compared to 40% of Victorian and 47% of students in schools similar in size and demographic to KHPS; in Writing, only 26% scored in the top two bands - this lower result is consistent with and in fact still higher than the 19% of Victorian students and 22% of students in similar schools

While we celebrate these successes, it is also important to remember that NAPLAN is a snapshot of performance on one day. It provides useful information to our school about the impact of our programs on our students' learning, and we use this data as a starting point to inquire into areas where we may need to improve what we are doing. We must also rely on a broad range of other data that we collect as a school and that individual class-room teachers collect to measure learning day by day, week by week, month by month, year by year.

Individual learners are so much more than their NAPLAN results. At KHPS we offer comprehensive programs to support student achievement, engagement and wellbeing in any number of areas that cannot be measured by this particular test. As Einstein once said, *Not everything that can be counted, counts; and not everything that counts can be counted.*

With this in mind, I would like to invite every one of our families to consider, *What counts at Kingston Heath Primary School?* What are our strengths? What programs, learning spaces, approaches and traditions support our learning community to excel? Early next term, as part of our School Review, we will be asking you to answer these questions through surveys, focus group discussions, and open forums. Please watch for more information through our newsletters and via COMPASS. We would like to capture as many voices as possible as we work through our review.

Every four to five years, every school undertakes a formal School Review which involves collecting data and information from across the school and community to evaluate ourselves against the goals that we set in our last strategic plan and against the expectations of the Department of Education. Our staff have begun this review process. On the recent Curriculum Day, staff worked in teams to review KHPS against the Department's Framework for Improving Student Outcomes. This framework, often referred to as FISO, outlines the evidence-based approaches schools are expected to choose from when implementing programs to enhance student achievement, engagement and wellbeing. 
<u>Action</u>

Action is one of the Essential Elements of the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme. It isn't any more or less important than the rest of the Essential Elements, but I do believe that it is one of the most empowering elements, where students can see the accumulation of all of their knowledge, skills and progress as learners coming together to make a *real* and tangible difference.

The Purpose of Taking Action

The aim is, through inquiry, to have students come up with responsible, thoughtful and meaningful action that will make an impact. This impact does not have to be earth-shattering for the world. It does have to **connect** with their learning, **giving a sense of purpose** to their learning through experience and **enabling their voice** to shine through. This is extremely empowering. Think about the impact that taking action has on yourself; from checking off your daily to-do list, to accomplishing a marathon event (or a marathon!) The impact begins with how you feel about yourself and, depending on the action, can have a domino effect in that it affects others in your immediate community, wider community or even globally. Regardless of the extent of the ripple effect of your action, it becomes empowering. So, how do we transfer this to students?

Making it Happen The best way to encourage student action is to begin by giving students the knowledge of what action looks like. We want them to be able to identify appropriate action. It can be narrowed down to two forms:



- **Personal Action** What can I do for myself to make a change that will benefit me?
- Action for Others What can I do for others? (local community, wider community, global action)
