Student Excellence Program

This term, we have all thoroughly enjoyed participating in the Student Excellence program. There is a real buzz around the school each Thursday with students enjoying learning about topics that are of interest to them and working alongside peers from other year levels and classes. It is also a great opportunity for students to connect with teachers that they might not know as well.

Staff Professional Learning

We are very fortunate at Kingston Heath Primary School to have a staff who are dedicated to their own professional growth and development, and invest time in developing their practice for the betterment of all of our students. A key focus for our staff this year has been on enhancing teaching practices through our instructional model and the Victorian Teaching and Learning Model 2.0 (VTLM 2.0). Staff have participated in whole-school workshops, collaborative planning sessions, and coaching to support consistency in literacy and numeracy instruction. We are also continuing to embed the School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) framework, strengthening our approach to student engagement and wellbeing. These professional learning opportunities ensure that our teaching team remains reflective, innovative, and aligned with best practice, always with student success at the centre of our work.

Transition Programs

This term, we have also placed a strong focus on **transition** – preparing students for the next stage in their educational journey.

- Our 2026 Foundation students and their families have been invited to attend the first of our transition preparation sessions. These sessions are designed to familiarise children with our classrooms, teachers, and routines, helping them feel confident and excited about starting school.
- For our Year 6 students, transition to secondary school remains a major milestone. Staff have been working closely with students and local secondary schools to ensure they feel supported and ready for this next step. Activities have included orientation sessions, discussions about managing change, and building skills in independence and organisation.







Year 1 & 2 News

LITERACY

The year 1/2 's have been working really hard learning all about information texts. They began with an informational narrative "Migaloo the White Whale" which is about an actual whale named Migaloo. While this isn't a traditional style of information text, students are learning that factual information can be shared in many different ways. They have then explored a number of informational texts and have been able to identify the different features often used in information writing, such as title, headings, sub-headings, contents and glossary. Using their knowledge, students will next do their own research and present their information in the form of a poster.





MATHS

In maths, students have been exploring analogue clocks. They used blocks to visually represent the minutes and hours on a clock face and have been able to identify the different features of an analogue clock. They have experienced how long a minute is and different activities you can do within a minute. Some found a minute can feel like it has gone past really fast doing one activity, whereas how many times they could hop in a minute made the time seem to go really slow! Next, we are moving onto length where students will use both informal and formal units to measure.



BOOKWEEK

Our bookweek parade was a huge success! There were so many different costumes and it was extra special having Ruby in, dressed as a dalmatian from 101 Dalmatians! She was by far the biggest hit! We especially enjoyed the variety of characters students dressed in, particularly since most costumes actually came from a story, not just a movie. We were also lucky enough to have Steve Mushin, an actual author, come in to talk to us about his book "Ultra Wild" and how he turns his inventions into real-life machines, such as the giant composting millipede that was built and now lives in a playground for all to enjoy. He gave such great encouragement to all students, reminding them that anyone can be an artist, you just start with a shape.











UNIT OF INQUIRY

We had a fun way of ending our last Unit of Inquiry Sharing the Planet, where we made dancing ghosts! We learnt that while static electricity is a form of energy, it isn't really helpful or usable, so scientists found better ways to harness and use electricity. We specifically looked at how we can use renewable resources to power our homes so we don't run out in the future.





MYSTERY READER

In 1/2, we have been lucky enough to have a number of mystery readers come in to read their favourite picture story book to us. Mr Mac has about a million favourite books, so he is always a popular visitor! Thank you to all of the parents and families who have been able to sign up to join in the mystery reading this semester. The biggest surprise so far has been Milla's family, not just having one member sign up, but two! Caleb and Mrs Joyce have been recent readers, and we continue to enjoy a different visitor each Friday.







Year 3 & 4 News


Author Visit: Steve Mushin

To kick off Book Week, students had a visit from Author Steve Mushin who wrote the book Ultrawild: Every city on Earth. Steve talked about the ideas behind his book and how Authors develop their 'artists flow'. Steve discussed many inventions of the future that people came up with many years ago that are now a part of real lives.

Students had time to draw and sketch a future invention. Here is what they came up with.

"I made a shelter for homeless people. There is free food, books, some beds, and a cat to support. There is also a beehive on the roof that has a tube connecting to the food section that conveys honey into the kitchen. 





